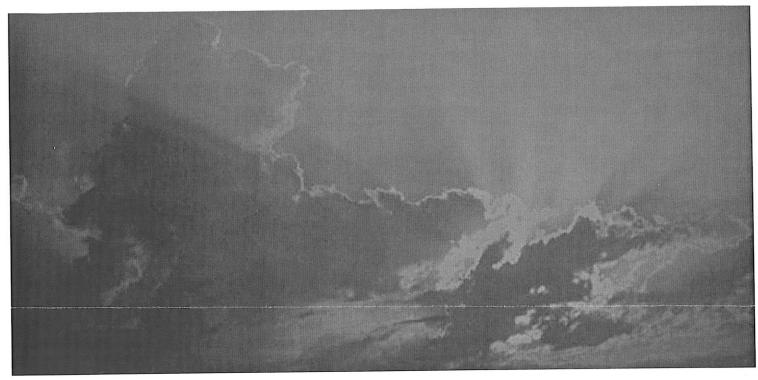

Richard J. Maguire, a respected friend and bus industry leader, passed away on Monday, October 29, 2001, after a brief period of illness.

Born in Pottsville, PA, on August 2, 1932, he was the son of the late Joseph L. and Lena G. Maguire. He attended Pottsville area schools and was a 1950 graduate of Valley Forge Military Academy (Wayne, PA). He then attended and graduated from Lehigh

Transportation Company (Reading Trailways) nearly doubled the size and Capitol service area.

Dick served on the Board of National Trailways for many years. He also was an active member of the Pennsylvania Bus Association and was their President from 1969 to 1972.

Dick was a "hands on" manager - always eager to assist everyone, especially in times of heavy travel. Dick could often be seen in the terminal areas loading passengers and luggage. His employees were proud to be part of the "Maguire Family".

He was a member of the First United Methodist Church, Pottsville, PA, and served as president of our Museum of Bus Transportation.

University (Bethlehem, PA) in 1954 with a degree in Industrial Engineering. In 1955 he received a degree in Business Administration from Lehigh.

Although he assisted in the family business, Capitol Bus Company (Capitol Trailways) during his school years, he joined the business full-time upon graduation from Lehigh.

While serving as Vice-President of Operations at Capitol the company expanded rapidly. Its largest acquisition under Dick, Reading Trailways in 1972. He served in this capacity until he retired in 1988. His many accomplishments included establishment of an airport connector service from Harrisburg Area Airport to BWI Airport outside Baltimore, installation of a two-way radio system in all Capitol buses in 1977, purchase of the Cameron Street property and remodeling it into a modem office and service facility, creation of the "Bus to the Big Apple" - Harrisburg to New York City through service, and purchasing one of the first fleet of MCI's to enter Trailways service.

He is survived by his wife, the former Ann L. Hafer, to whom he was married 41 years.

He will be sadly missed by all of the many friends he had in this industry - somehow it will not quite be the same. His inspiration, guidance, and humor will be with us all for many years to come. Dick Maguire was a true transportation professional with a passion for serving the public.
