In Memorium—Robert E. Sauer, Jr. by Terry Cosentino

Mr. Robert E Sauer, Jr, of Arlington, Virginia, passed away on August 9, 2018 at the age of 78. Mr. Sauer had a lifetime interest in transportation history and vehicles. He was the author of several trolley history books and motorcoach articles.

Mr. Sauer was a member of the Museum of Bus Transportation since 1998 and he attended each Spring Fling Event until 2015, when he became too ill to travel. He supported the Museum financially and was an annual sponsor of our 1951 Brill School Bus. He actually rode it when attending elementary school in Reading, Pennsylvania School District.

Mr. Sauer was a transportation specialist employed by the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority for 24 years, retiring in 1997.

Mr. Sauer begueathed \$15,000 to the Museum of Bus Transportation, which is greatly appreciated in the continuance of our Museum's Mission.

Model Bus Musings by Doug Campbell



It seems that various manufacturers are slowly releasing new model buses. However, I feel bad that since a few years ago, when CORGI got out of the American models market, there were some fine releases over the years past. Alas, even this year, there are no more new European castings being released in the United Kingdom. Hopefully, Hornby will get CORGI reorganized and in better financial condition and we will see some new buses in the more distant future from them.

First, this month, I'm going "back in the stacks" and am reviewing a great toy model bus that I purchased in a toy shop in Toronto Canada back in August of 1977. It's a colorful 14" long friction motor powered (makes a weird "clicking" sound when running) rather generic, but unusual, "Airport Limousine" bus. It was made in China, numbered MF 910. There is no manufacturer identification except for some Chinese characters on the box. The model is full of details. It has a front destination sign of ST-529 and an unusual Chinese manufacturer (?) logo above the front grill plate. On the rear of the coach is a script "Shanghai" lettering in silver, and seats are pressed out of the lithographed interior, with a plastic steering wheel. Lights are in red or yellow plastic and nice chrome trim is attached to the bus. Windows are all in clear plastic and two plastic white roof vents raise on the roof. Rubber tires with white wall sides and chrome wheels set off the bus and even today, over 40 years later, it remains as a favorite model bus in my collection. The original price in Canada back in 1977 was \$5.97!



Now that "Round 2" has bought Mini Metals/Classic Motor Works models, they are once again producing many new fine releases, including, yes, BUSES! This new plastic edition GMC TDH-3610 Transit Bus is in the colors/destination of ATLANTA, and has nice "Coca-Cola" ad graphics on the sides, with the Coca-Cola Company's headquarters being located there. Mini-Metals has a new "Coke" license program, so

these "Coke" models cost a few pennies more and this GMC Atlanta bus is one of only 744 produced. I had to attach the tiny windshield wipers and side mirror, which are included in the blister pack under the bus. Tires are rubber and many tiny details are to be seen on this attractive model in HO scale, 4" long.



New also from Mini-Metals is this HO scale, 4 3/4" long plastic model of a GMC PD- 4103 Intercity Bus, lettered and colored for Indiana Motor Bus Company in an attractive blue/red /silver and white color scheme. What is interesting about the model is that it is the replica of the bus President Dwight Eisenhower used when doing his campaign in Indiana. I have included a photo of both sides as the graphics are different. This is one of 600 models produced, so a rather limited issue!

Also using the same GM-PD-4103 casting, Mini-Metals has just released this TRAILWAYS version as the bus President John Kennedy used in his early campaign for President. Again, as you can see, graphics are different on both sides and the buyer attaches side mirrors. The tires are rubber, with, as on last model, many tiny front and rear graphics. The front destination board reads "CHARTERED." The Kennedy/ Johnson graphics will make this a very popular release and, again, it is one of only 600 made.

Next is a model from a European bus series sold on news-stands. This model's package indicates, that it is from Italy, made in Bangladesh by Hachette Models. This rather unusual looking 1/43 plastic/metal model is a Renault AGP85 Saharten coach with two ladders at rear sides and a covered roof section, maybe for storing the luggage. The model is 5" long, and, although the rear section has no windows, it IS a BUS, and has some seats (maybe rear section to store the luggage), and along the sides are listed towns in Europe, Alger, Zinder, Kano, Niamey, and Fort Lamy. With a center side door, the model is in silver with many details!



From Iconic Replicas of Florida (made in China), comes this new 1:87 scale 6" long Van HoolCX-45 coach in the attractive red colors of DATTCO lines of New England. Graphics are perfect in EVERY details, including "our buses, our people, and you" rear graphics! The DATTCO emblem is emblazoned on the roof, with bus number as on the real fleet, and rear view mirrors are attached at time of manufacture.

Full interior and many tiny graphic details really make Iconic Replicas the "gold standard" in this size model bus!



Also new from Iconic Replicas is this MCI J4500 motorcoach, again in 1:87 scale. It is 6 "long, and is the FIRST really exact and accurate model I have ever seen of the current PETER PAN bus lines fleet! From their Springfield, MA headquarters. This handsome fleet is so often seen on American highways representing one of America's largest bus companies. On this replica, even the tiny "peterpanbus.com" lettering is perfectly seen along the tiny edge just above the side windows. The graphic work on these tiny models is just superb. Again, side mirrors are attached by the factory and full interior is in there. This is, in my opinion, a stunning model bus for its size, and certainly, I hope, the standard of future model bus manufacturing!

John R. Oakman — a gift to the industry that just keeps giving

am pleased to share with fellow columnist Dave Millhouser in acknowledging the good work of friend and industry leader John Oakman whose 50-year career just keeps going and going — as Millhouser covered in Bus and Motorcoach News, and capsulized here to introduce others in this vast and varied industry to Oakman's remarkable contributions.

As CoachUSA senior vice president, fleet and maintenance, Oakman only appears to be throttling back in his new part-time position as vehicle procurement manager, working with OEMs to improve specifications and complete deliveries.

Clearly, one of Oakman's more significant achievements has been his work in adapting the Van Hool TD925 double decker for the US market; first with ABC Companies, Faribault, MN, and then with CoachUSA, Paramus, NJ, Identifying

and implementing necessary engineering changes and gaining regulatory approval.

According to Millhouser,
Oakman's lifetime fascination with
motorcoaches began with a brokedown bus en route to his high school
youth camp — and the paper clip he
used to make the repair.

It was enough to impress his future wife, Cindy, who was riding on the bus. The young couple moved to Colorado in 1970. There Oakman maintained coaches for Young Life, a Christian youth outreach organization, while driving 50,000 miles a year.



Industry veterans Tim Vaught, John Oakman, the late Fred Dunikoski and Dave Millhouser met up at the Hounds of the Mother Road in Adrian, TX, with a bus on loan from ABC Companies.

Oakman went on to work for Hausman Bus Sales, the precursor to Motor Coach Industries (MCI), and helped establish the company's facility in New Jersey; all the while inadvertently drawing other Young Life Transportation alumni into the industry; familiar names that include Noel Patterson, Sandy Baker, John White, Dick Baxter, Skip Neff, Bob Dethloff and Millhouser.

Oakman blazed on, joining American Coach Sales and then the Martz Group, where he established the Central Florida division. In his initial stint with CoachUSA, he assisted with its restructuring, as well as the successful implementation of Megabus.

During this time, he moved over to ABC Companies to run the Winter Garden, FL, facility and eventually spearheaded the Van Hool TD925 double-decker adaptation, which drew him back to CoachUSA.

In his spare time, Oakman serves on the board of the Museum of Bus Transportation, Hershey PA, and as transportation safety adviser to Young Life.
